
Financial Spotlight

Financial Spotlight; Funding the End to Child Trafficking




Sponsoring Children and Clearing the Waiting List

Thanks to our amazing supporters, BIZAA has rescued hundreds of children from the streets, farms and domestic servitude, and set their lives on a new direction of education, learning, training and opportunity. Despite the lagging impact of the worldwide pandemic, in 2022 we were able to grow our child sponsorship almost 6% over the prior year!

The BIZAA College of Technology, established in 2016, offers post-secondary students additional training in Electrical Engineering, Information Technology and Tailoring. Since the Spring of 2019, our graduates have gone on to secure jobs, volunteer or continue their education at a university.

Mission Trip Update

Our last formal mission trip was in 2018, due first to some political unrest and then, most recently, to the global pandemic. Finally, this year a scaled-down mission trip occurred to the delight of our sponsored children and colleagues. Terry Provo accompanied Okey to Lagos, Nigeria in September, bringing t-shirts, gifts and supplies for the children and staff, and offering training for BIZAA's local staff. Instead of traveling from Lagos to the rural communities, six staff surprised our

two missionaries by bringing 12 of the sponsored children to Lagos in the BIZAA van. It was a long-overdue 3-day reunion with joyful tears, precious singing, and African dancing, including many great moves by Sister Mother General! Terry and Okey also traveled to a Lagos school and interviewed families with at-risk children who are in desperate need of sponsorship. We're planning to go again in 2023 so stay tuned for more updates!





























Partnership Update: Days for Girls

In our 2021 annual report we told you about our partnership with an amazing international organization, **Days for Girls** (www.daysforgirls. org), which provides reusable feminine hygiene kits for young women in countries with "period poverty". These beautiful hand-sewn kits offer a healthy solution that help keep girls in school and prevent the absenteeism that often happens

when women lack access to adequate and affordable menstrual supplies. In 2021 BIZAA brought 160 kits, enough for all our female students and staff. This year, the Maple Grove Chapter of Days for Girls provided an additional 325 kits, filling a huge need, not only for our BIZAA families, but for their communities as well! Nigerian Staff Spotlight:

Reverend Mother Obioma, PhD Dean of Student Affairs and Student Counsellor

What are your responsibilities in your role with BIZAA?

The serious mission of identifying children at risk and moving them from the streets to the classroom falls under my watch. Rescued children have experienced various degrees of trauma and abuse that no child should be exposed to. I provide counselling to all BIZAA children (those sponsored and those on the waiting list), their families and our Nigerian BIZAA Staff. My office and staff work with our affiliated schools to ensure professional monitoring of the child's progress in their academics, overall wellbeing and societal integration. We then share progress updates with sponsors twice a year and work with the children on their career goals.

What is your educational background?

I majored in Guidance and Counselling, and I recently graduated from a doctorate program in Psychology.

You also have another important role outside of BIZAA. Can you tell us a little more about that?

I am the Mother General of an autonomous faithbased religious organization called the Two Hearts of Love Congregation. There, I have overall managerial responsibilities, including the oversight of all congregational activities and affairs.

When and why did you become involved with BIZAA?

I began with this selfless, one-in-a-million organization in 2018, so it has been a remarkable and memorable five years and counting! I became involved because BIZAA shares the same vision as my congregation, specifically to perform corporal works of mercy, serve humanity and empower youth, especially the poor and vulnerable who, without an organization like BIZAA, have little opportunity for a brighter future. These have been my undying passions, and I am immensely fulfilled when I see rescued children become educated and contributing members of society.

Tell us a story about how BIZAA has impacted a child's life.

This experience still brings tears to my eyes. There is a BIZAA child named Chinedu Onyema Harry Dim, whose father died when he was two months old; thus, he never knew his father nor the feeling of a father's love. His widowed mother, solely responsible for his wellbeing, was struggling to provide and barely able to afford to feed him. As a result, Onyema helped the family by hawking (i.e. selling) groundnut on the street during the hours he was supposed to be in school. Daily he watched while other children went to school, wanting to go as well, but knowing there was no one to help

him fulfill his dreams. The local BIZAA staff identified and rescued him (followed by Mark and Debbie Wegner stepping up to sponsor him). When Onyema was told that he would be going to school, he wept. I asked him why he was crying, and he said, "I never knew that I would have a father again." I cried with him in his great joy, because BIZAA had become a "father to the fatherless". Onyema is now in Primary 4, loving school and improving tremendously in his academics.

What are you and your staff hoping to accomplish in 2023?

We are looking forward to improving communication channels with our American team and supporters, as well as enhancing the progress report template. Letters from the children to sponsors are an important way to stay connected so we'll be encouraging and engaging more children to do that. As financial resources become available, we want to increase and intensify our rescue capacity (ideally across all of Nigeria) as this model has directly reduced the rate of child abuse, domestic servitude and child labor in Nigeria.

You sound very busy! What do you like to do for fun? In my leisure I enjoy classical and folklore music, singing, dancing, reading and traveling.

What message do you have for BIZAA supporters and sponsors?

I am profoundly grateful for all our wonderful BIZAA supporters, who have faithfully granted us the needed support to drive this organization to where we are today. We remain faithfully committed and dedicated to the core values and mission of BIZAA. Through your support, you have saved and changed the lives of countless vulnerable children, just like the saying, "When you open a school door, you close a prison door." May the Good Lord continuously protect and preserve you all!
